It is hoped that, if we unavoidably have to postpone any outings in 2021 due to the pandemic, they can be rebooked for later in 2021.

Saturday 8th May

2 pm: St John the Baptist Church, Lea Marston and St Leonard's Church, Over Whitacre:

A visit to St John the Baptist Church, the Estate Church for the nearby Hams Hall Estate, belonging to the Adderley family, before moving onto St Leonard's. The present church, in the Baroque style, was built in 1765 although a chapel has existed in Over Whitacre from as early as 1203. Rita Poulson will give us the history of this beautiful chapel on a hill, and bring to life the many characters connected with the church during its history.

Monday 7th June

2 pm: Fire of Warwick walking tour:

The Great Fire of Warwick was a major conflagration that swept through Warwick on 5 September 1694 and lasted for six hours. The fire started from a spark from a torch that was being carried up the High Street. Follow the route of the fire with WLHS member Sue Rigby and then visit the Warwick courthouse to view facsimiles of contemporary documents with WLHS member Steven Wallsgrove.

Saturday 26th June

2 pm: Henley in Arden Guildhall, Heritage Centre and town:
Led by Dr Nat Alcock, visiting the 15th Century Guildhall building, and
taking a walking tour along Henley's historic High Street, before a
guided visit to the nearby Heritage Centre which charts the history of the
town from the Norman Conquest to the present day. **NB**: provision has
also been made to deliver this outing online, should Covid restrictions
prevent us from visiting in person.

Saturday 17th July

2 pm: Napton on the Hill church and village
Following a visit to St Lawrence's Church, built in the 13th Century,
Bernard Alsop will lead us on a History Walk around the village, starting
with the World War 2 Observer Post, from which Napton Windmill (now a
private residence), the canal, and countryside as far as Coventry can
clearly be seen. The walk will take in landmarks such as the old pound,
pillory green, old bakery, pub and memorial trees.

Saturday 4th September

2 pm: Bagot's Castle, Baginton

The Bagot's Castle archaeologist will take us on a tour of this 14th Century castle which now stands in ruins. The original building is believed to have been constructed on the site in the 11th century, at the time of King Henry

I. It was rebuilt as the current castle in the late 14th Century by Sir William Bagot.

In addition, keep a lookout for more details of an online talk organized by the County Record Office in Warwick entitled *Festivals, Feasting and Frolicking in Warwickshire's Past* which draws on their collections to tell tales about May Day, Advent, Christmas, Harvest and all sorts of other notable dates in the calendar. It will be a pre-recorded talk so we will be slotting it into our programme at a suitable time - once it becomes available.

Work starts on new Dugdale Society volume

Volunteers across Warwickshire have begun work on transcriptions for a new Dugdale Society publication with the working title: *Early Parish Accounts: A Window on Warwickshire Life*, 1520 – 1689.

A range of accounts from the parish chest will be included, those of the churchwardens, overseers of the poor and constables, as well as highway surveyors, parish charities and clerical accounts. It is hoped that the volume will bring to light the wealth of information in these underused primary source documents.

Most of the records being transcribed will come from Warwickshire County Record Office, who are also digitising the material for the volunteers to work with from home. Dr Bob Bearman is overseeing work on the transcriptions and Beat Kümin, Professor of History at the University of Warwick specialising in parish community research, is working with the team as an advisor.

Societies' news

Recent publications

Doyle, Linda, Chapel Ascote – A Deserted Village (Southam Heritage Collection, 2020) £7 plus £1.50 p&p, available from Southam Heritage Collection. Chapel Ascote is a small deserted parish on the edge of Ladbroke and Bishops Itchington, and when working on the farm, the author was intrigued by the unusual land marks, old pathways, pottery shards and strange shaped stones she found. She started to research the local history and found a 1653 document which said "anciently an eminent parish" and for many years past the estates being in "great men's hands" and she wanted to know – who were these Great Men? It is not written as an academic treatise, but as an introduction to the past history for visitors to the area and very accessible.

Skillman, S.C, *Paranormal Warwickshire* (Amberley, 2020), ISBN 978-1445-6982-67, £14.99. Not strictly history, but looking at long held local legends, *Paranormal Warwickshire* takes the reader into the world of ghosts and spirits in the county, following their footsteps into the unknown. These tales of haunted places, supernatural happenings and shadowy presences will delight the ghost hunters, and fascinate and intrigue everybody who knows Warwickshire. N
